

After postponing the Tour in 2020, this year we raised nearly \$5 million for Trillium Health Partners' Seniors Care Program, to help older adults achieve their best health and quality of life. Funds raised will contribute towards a new service model including expanded virtual platforms to connect seniors, their families, and experts. This will result in reduced hospital visits and better outcomes for older adults.

Tour de Bleu 2019: Looking Back at the Impact

The past 20 months have brought intense isolation and uncertainty, severely compounding a pre-existing mental health crisis among Canada's youth. We're pleased to take this opportunity to report on the impact of the \$4.4 million raised by Tour de Bleu 2019. The funds were dedicated towards CAMH's excellent work supporting youth mental illness prevention and recovery, which has been vitally important during the pandemic.

\$4.4 million raised by Tour de Bleu 2019 contributed to:

- 4 new YWHOs (Youth Wellness Hubs Ontario), taking the total number up to 14; YWHOs provide a one-stop-shop model of community-based mental health care and other supports for young people ages 13 to 29.
- Testing and evaluation of a Depression Early Warning digital tool that detects relapse in youth with depression before symptoms become severe.

Special Opportunities

The Peter Gilgan Foundation occasionally makes large commitments to critical health care and community institutions embarking on time-limited, large-scale, transformational efforts. We call these partnerships 'Special Opportunities'.

SickKids Hospital's Peter Gilgan Centre for Research and Learning

In the PGCRL, conversations can spark breakthroughs. That's what happened when scientists with different specialties housed together in the PGCRL's Cell Biology neighbourhood collaborated to study patients with an unknown inflammation disorder.

Daniel was the most affected patient. A positive kid, he took illness in stride. But life was restricted. He was unable to join in the rough and tumble of childhood play or team sports, like hockey, that forge bonds in his hometown. He took a slew of medications and spent time at SickKids when his symptoms flared up. For over a decade, the cause of Daniel's illness had his doctors stumped.

The SickKids research team was determined to unravel the mystery. Gene seguencing and basic science sleuthing led to a series of discoveries that found a rare new disease and its cause—a protein called ARPC1B that was missing in Daniel and underperforming in the other patients. Finally, Daniel and his fellow patients had a definitive diagnosis.

The discovery led to the possibility of a cure for Daniel: a bone marrow transplant. Daniel now has a new, fully functioning immune system, complete with the missing protein. "Life-altering" is how Daniel's mother, Christina, describes the discovery. "To think it took this long and so many minds is humbling," she says.



Grant Program

Environment & Sustainability

In 2021, our Environment & Sustainability grants focused on green skills and ventures, sustainable and affordable food and energy, and youth climate leadership.

Projects like **Mission from MaRS: Climate Action** and **Climate Ventures' Earth Tech** are helping talented clean-tech entrepreneurs to develop and scale climate solutions.

Flash Forest is a great example: a reforestation start-up that modifies drones to fire rapidly germinating tree seeds into the earth, creating green jobs and building natural carbon capture and storage.

Workforce 2030 and **Iron & Earth** provide training, skills development, and routes to employment in green construction and renewable energy.

Meanwhile **EcoTrust Canada** is creating green jobs and providing clean, affordable energy for rural, remote, and Indigenous communities. Replacing diesel furnaces with central air-source heat pumps increases reliability of heating, saves money, and reduces GHG emissions.

International Development

In 2021, our International Development grants focused on the UN Sustainable Development Goals of maternal and child health, and education and economic opportunities for women and girls.

This is Darling Melissa Vicente Amador, a participant in a **CARE Canada**-led consortium supporting small-scale farmers in Honduras. The project focuses on marginalized Indigenous women, providing training to affirm their social, political, and economic rights as well as practical skills in new technologies and climate change resilient farming.

University of Cape Town and Partners In Health are training the next generation of local paediatricians and building capacity in specialized pediatric care in Sub-Saharan Africa and Haiti, respectively.

Children, Youth & Families

In 2021, our Children, Youth & Families grants focused on Indigenous education and livelihoods, promoting educational success and access to post-secondary education, routes to employment for young people, support for marginalized women and young mothers, and community wellbeing.

Most of our partners focus on holistic, integrated solutions that cater to participants' social, emotional, and wellness needs in addition to providing practical supports to achieve educational and employment success.

Access to fresh, nutritious, affordable food is a crosscutting theme across many programs. New-to-us this year, **MABELLEarts** is a community-led organization in Central Etobicoke that is transitioning the MABELLEpantry from an emergency response to food insecurity, to a long-term sustainable market model

Organizations like **Teach for Canada** and **Indspire** help to address the significant educational inequalities facing Indigenous youth in Canada.

Meanwhile, **EntrepreNorth**, **Water First**, and others are helping to develop opportunities for sustainable livelihoods in Indigenous communities in the North.




Impact Investing

To date, we have committed \$2 million to impact investments and are on our way to building a robust portfolio.

Our current portfolio is focused on the themes of Health & Wellness, and Environment, with a significant concentration of investment in sustainable food systems.





Peter Gilgan Foundation is proud to include the InvestEco Sustainable Food Fund as part of our current portfolio. This Toronto-based, environmentally focused venture capital firm has invested in over 30 individual companies since its inception in 1999. Their mission is to "build companies that matter" by investing in firms that will provide strong financial returns in the sustainable food and agriculture sectors, as well as promote health and mitigate environmental impact. InvestEco is a forerunner in the Impact Investing space, and has been involved in the launch of many leading international sustainable food brands.
